1. Welcome and Introductions	Judge Twine-Thomas opened the meeting at 10:01 am. Introductions were made. Minutes from the November 17, 2017 meeting were reviewed. Gary White moved to approve the minutes and Elvin Martinez seconded. Minutes were approved.
2. Updates	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Probation (Judy Roysden) – <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ On December 22, 2017, Probation staff from Circuit 13 Juvenile Probation Officer teamed up with members of the Hillsborough County Sheriff Office District 3 to conduct ride-along curfew checks for those youth who are on home detention, absconders, and failure to appears. On December 22, 2017. 25 youth were contacted 2 were in violation of curfew and 1 picked up with a warrant. ○ There is a new Human Trafficking Director for DJJ, Katherine Gomez. Jesus Sosa is our local liaison. Any youth who gets a hit on the new human trafficking tool that is administered by DJJ or DCF is staffed weekly with the Human Trafficking Team on Tuesdays. The team includes Eckerd, DJJ, HCSO CPI, AG’s office, Runaway Specialist Robin Lattimore, TPD, HCSO and the FBI. ○ The final forms for the Red Flag Staffing are being sent out. Qualifying children are 12 years old or younger with behavioral or mental health concerns and one of the following: post adoption, criminal charges related to family violence, 2 or more arrests, 2 or more Baker Acts or children 7 years old or younger with behavioral or mental health concerns and 1 of the following: 1 or more baker acts or any DJJ/JAC history. A request can be sent by the school, DJJ, JA, Eckerd, CPID or a mental health provider. • Detention (Marcus Wilson) – An increasing number of youth are being detained longer than 21 days due to new prolific offender legislation. As of yesterday, there were 62 children in secure detention. 4 of the children were classified as prolific juvenile offenders. There were 13 children detained over 21 days. • JDAI (Sarah Blumberg) - <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ DV numbers December down across all parts of detention, 22 youth brought in JAC in December for Domestic Violence. 9 were released home, 9 went to secure detention, and 4 were taken to Lake Magdalene. 5 of the 9 detained juveniles were “missed opportunities” meaning they did not score for secure detention but were held anyway because they could not be placed within 6 hours.. ○ Ms. Blumberg is looking at applying or the Reimagining Juvenile Justice Training opportunity. There is no cost for the training site that is chosen but we would have to provide training space. Rob Parkinson offered to provide training space

at the county center. He said if we obtain the grant, we want to find staff who have the potential to be future leaders in juvenile justice. JoAnn Rollins also offered training space at the Lake Magdalene campus. Lt. Rojka made motion that an application be submitted by Jan 25, 2018. Gary White seconded and the motion passed unanimously.

- DJJ Prevention (Pat McGhee) – Ms. McGhee was not present. No updates were given.
- Civil Citation (Monica Martinez) – Ms. Martinez said 29 children were given civil citations in the community in December and 48 in the school system. 6 children were unsuccessful. Of the unsuccessful children, 1 was a no show, 2 had parents who declined the program and 3 were ineligible.
- Safe & Sound Update (Julianne Holt) – Safe Summit 18 will be held on May 19, 2018 at Blake High School. Safe and Sound has started a relationship with Greco Middle School and is working on a mentorship program and other programs. The Public Defender’s Office has partnered with Safe and Sound through Freddy Barton, who will talk to every child in the detention center so we can figure out how they got there, from a holistic approach. Kevin Beckner inquired if USF was going to be involved. Ms. Holt indicated that USF may be involved in the future but for now, the project is starting with Mr. Barton. Rob Parkinson suggested that the interview be structured, noting there are materials on the internet and Dr. Dembo may be able to assist. Ms. Holt said the first part of this project will be have the children talking to us as opposed to giving yes or no answers.
- JAC (Jennifer Cristiano) – Ms. Cristiano said we are still looking for a champion for community connections project. Ms. Holt stood up, acknowledged Gina Justice who was present at the meeting, and said stakeholders agree conceptually with the project. Ms. Holt suggests that it would best to seek a public and private funding plan. Ms. Holt asked who would be willing to assist in leveraging personal contacts to help develop the private funding aspect. Several members agreed to assist. Ms. Holt will give an update at the February Executive CAB meeting.
- CINS/FINS (Julie Edison, JoAnn Rollins and Rhonda Rhodes) Ms. Edison discussed program including aftercare and counselling components. Resource centers are located throughout the county to receive outpatient services. There is a staffing committee set up for cases where the services are not working. Services are free of charge. The direct line for the program is 813-272-6606,
- Lake Magdalene DV Beds (Sarah Blumberg) – Covered in JDAI Update and in Alternative DV Plans sections of these minutes.
- Member Reports:
 - Lt. Rojka said that Feb 9 is school day for the State fair. Community Action Teams (CAT) are being formed and include community leaders, law enforcement, and members of boards such as ours) will be walking around the fair to help ensure safety. If any member of this board would like to be a part of the CAT team, please notify Lt. Rojka.
 - Elvin Martinez, Jr said that a committee has been meeting to update the DRAI. One notable change is that grand theft motor vehicle is being scored at 6 points with an additional point if the child is over 16. This will result in more children being detained for GTMV.

	<ul style="list-style-type: none">- Mr. White said that the Hillsborough County Anti-Drug Alliance is in agreement with PACE and Department of Children’s Services for universal screening to identify risky behavior, particularly with substance abuse. The children will be tracked by age, zip code and substance. Marijuana is number 1 and Alcohol number 2. Mr. White will give a presentation before the executive board in April.- Mr. White invited board members to attend the 2018 6th Annual Southeastern US Regional Drug Prevention Summit which is being held on 2/19/18 at the Pepin Hospitality Center. He will forward the flyer to Mr. Brancato for distribution to the board by email.- Mr. White also invited board members to attend the HCADA annual meeting on January 31, 2018 at noon at the Children’s Board. He will send the invitation to Mr. Brancato for distribution.
3. 2019-2021 Comprehensive Circuit Plan	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Elvin Martinez, Jr. – The subcommittee met and updated the comprehensive circuit plan, making no substantial changes. The subcommittee essentially updated the plan and brought it up to date for 2016/2017 using more-recent data. Delinquency numbers have decreased dramatically except over the last year it is leveled out. We may be identifying the new normal number. Need a new plan by July. Mr. Martinez will reconvene the subcommittee to complete the update. The subcommittee will likely need to meet two or three times.
4. 5. 2018 Legislative Update	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Elvin Martinez, Jr. – Mr. Martinez passed out and went over a memo he created, summarizing bills currently before the legislature including funding.
6. Presentations	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Alternative DV Plans (Sarah Blumberg) – Ms. Blumberg presented on the Alternative Community Engagement Services Center (ACES) which is located in Pima, AZ. This program helps ensure children suspected of domestic violence have a safe and timely non-detention respite with access to immediate services. The ACES facility not only functions as a place to “cool off,” but also provides services such as safety planning, success planning, screenings to assess individual needs and up to 23 hours of respite services. Ms. Blumberg’s presentation including a 2017 chart showing “missed opportunities” in our circuit where children who did not score detention were held anyway because services were not arranged within 6 hours. Mr. Parkinson suggested that the Board add DVAC consideration to any future plans to enhance the JAC/Community Connections Center. Mr. Brancato asked what is causing the missed opportunities in our jurisdiction. Ms. Blumberg said it is a multitude of things including parents not signing the required forms in time, the time of night that the child is placed in custody, bed space, etc. Judge Twine Thomas noted that the missed opportunity kids usually only spend one day in detention and then are released. Mr. Brancato said that that even one day can cause harm. Ms. Rollins asked if the respite had to be in the form of a shelter and asked if it could be in the form of staying with a family member such as an aunt, outside of the home. Lt. Rojka said this that a more structured approach than simply placing the child with a relative is needed by law enforcement, due to the heightened need to ensure safety of everyone in DV cases. Ms. Roysden said that DV arrests cause many collateral consequences for children including exclusion from the military and law enforcement jobs. She suggested that it is time to reconsider adding DV to civil citations. Lt. Rojka said he believes the time may be right and he does not anticipate current objection from law enforcement or at least the police chief. He offered to head a subcommittee and several stakeholders offered to join his subcommittee.
7. Acknowledgements/ Announcements	A motion to adjourn was made by Lt. Rojka and seconded by Gary White. The meeting was adjourned at 11:46 a.m.
