

# RESIDENTIAL SERVICES

The Florida Department of Juvenile Justice supports adherence to the Risk Principle, which dictates the intensity and duration of services provided should mimic the risk level of the youth, with higher risk youth receiving more intense services for a longer period of time. Research shows intensive services provided to low risk youth are iatrogenic, meaning that they have the unintended consequence of actually increasing recidivism

likelihood. The risk of the youth, based on validated assessment, should guide the restrictiveness level of the placement, as risk identifies risk to public safety. The needs of the youth should be addressed by appropriately matched services, regardless of the placement level.

Delinquent youth in Florida can be ordered by a court into a residential treatment facility. Following recommendations provided by the Florida Department of Juvenile Justice (DJJ), circuit judges determine the level of confinement for each youth. The DJJ is responsible for placement of each youth in a residential program based on the youth's identified risks and needs.

A youth is committed to a residential program for an indeterminate length of time and must complete an individualized treatment plan. The goals of the plan are based on personal rehabilitative needs and are one of the requirements for release. Included in each youth's goals are educational and vocational services. Residential Services oversees all residential commitment programs. Residential facilities are divided within DJJ into three regions:

- North Region:
  - West – Judicial Circuits 1, 2, 3, and 14.
  - East – Judicial Circuits 4, 5, 7, and 8
- Central Region: Judicial Circuits 6, 9, 10, 12, 13, and 18.
- South Region: Judicial Circuits 11, 15, 16, 17, 19, and 20.

During the reporting period, DJJ contracted for the operation of a variety of residential programs to serve committed youth for each of the three regions. Programs vary by restrictiveness level<sup>1</sup>, defined in Section 985.03 (46), Florida Statutes (2013) as "...the level of programming and security provided by programs that service the supervision, custody, care, and treatment needs of committed children." Higher restrictiveness levels are characterized by increased security, closer supervision, more intensive treatment, and longer lengths of stay. During the period covered in this report, the statute designates three residential restrictiveness levels of commitment:

- Non-secure residential
- High-risk residential
- Maximum-risk residential

However, minimum-risk commitment (a non-residential commitment level), is also referenced in Section 985.03 (46), Florida Statutes (2013). Minimum-risk commitment is managed through the Office of Probation and Community Intervention and is reported in that chapter of this report. These programs work with youth who remain in the community and participate at least 5 days per week in a day treatment program. This chapter focuses on the three residential restrictiveness levels.

Section 985.441, Florida Statutes directs the juvenile courts to commit an adjudicated youth to one of the residential restrictiveness levels based on the nature of the offense, security concerns, and treatment needs of the youth. Within the restrictiveness level chosen by the juvenile court, DJJ personnel choose a specific program to best meet the treatment needs of the youth. Based on the needs of the youth, these programs provide services and opportunities that include, but are not limited to:

- Screening and assessment services
- Gender specific programming
- Case management
- Transition planning
- Medical services
- Mental health services
- Substance abuse treatment
- Individual and family counseling
- Behavioral management
- Restorative justice programming
- Gang-related behavior intervention
- Parenting skills
- Life and social skills
- Educational and vocational services
- Self-sufficiency planning
- Job training and placement
- Religious and spiritual activities
- Community involvement
- Physical and recreational activities
- Cognitive behavioral therapy

In addition, some programs provide the following services:

- Medical services (intensive)
- Specialized mental health services (dual diagnosis, comprehensive or intensive)
- Specialized substance abuse treatment
- Sex offender treatment
- Developmentally disabled and/or borderline developmentally disabled

The specialty treatments include: mental health, substance abuse, dual diagnosis, sex offender treatment, and programs for youth with developmental disabilities. It should be noted that beginning with the Comprehensive Accountability Reports for FY 2012-13 releases and completions, the program types, as they had been historically listed, were changed. In June of 2012 the Department revamped the current Juvenile Justice Information System (JJIS) to better identify the specific types of behavioral and mental health services that are provided to youth. These services include borderline developmentally disabled, comprehensive mental health, and integrated substance abuse treatment to name a few. Residential programs with specialized beds received funding from one or more of the following sources during fiscal year 2015-16:

- Substance Abuse Treatment Overlay Services (SAOS): Funding for SAOS is provided by state general revenue. Programs typically receive \$35 per day, per bed in addition to the provider contracted per diem rate.
- Specialty Mental Health Programs: Funding for Specialized Mental Health Services is provided by state general revenue. Programs receive a daily contracted per diem rate commensurate with the restrictiveness level and type of services provided. These programs are designed for youth with serious to severe symptoms of mental health disorders, developmental disorders, and for juvenile sex offenders who are in need of a more intensive specialized treatment regimen.
- Mental Health Overlay Services (MHOS): Funding for Mental Health Overlay Services in programs is provided by state general revenue. Programs typically receive \$35 per day, per bed in addition to the provider contracted per diem rate.

**Profile of Youth**

The following tables provide demographic data taken from the Department's Juvenile Justice Information System (JJIS). The profile data are based on the number of youth, unduplicated, who were provided services by the Residential Services program area during FY 2015-16.

## Outcome Evaluation Performance

Program outputs and outcomes, including total releases, the percentage of youth adjudicated for offenses committed during placement (ODP), number of completions and completion rates, demographic characteristics, average length of stay, and recidivism rates, are presented for each commitment program that released youth within FY 2014-15. Fiscal year 2014-15 data are presented so that it is possible to track recidivism<sup>2</sup> for one year following program completion.

Characteristics of the youth who completed a residential commitment program during FY 2014-15 varied by program and restrictiveness level. For example, the extent and seriousness of the youth's delinquency history (as measured by the Average Prior Seriousness Index<sup>3</sup>) also varied by restrictiveness level from 28.1 for youth completing non-secure programs to 45.1 for youth completing maximum-risk programs. Average lengths of stay for completers ranged from 225.4 days for non-secure programs to 635.4 days for maximum-risk programs.

Effective July 1, 2014, low and moderate risk levels were combined to create the "non-secure" program level. This and subsequent Comprehensive Accountability Reports will report outcomes for youth released from non-secure, high, and maximum risk programs.

During FY 2014-15, there were a total of 2,847 releases from residential commitment programs. The rate of offenses during placement (OPD)<sup>4</sup> was 3%, indicating that approximately 3 in 100 youth were adjudicated or convicted for an offense that occurred while in a commitment program. The table below shows outcomes by restrictiveness level.

# NON-SECURE RESIDENTIAL PROGRAMS

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Non-secure residential programs begin the continuum of residential commitment programs within the Department of Juvenile Justice (DJJ). Non-secure programs are designed to represent youth who are a low or moderate risk to public safety and require close supervision. Youth may have a juvenile record that includes commitments for a third-degree felony or repeated misdemeanors and have usually performed unsuccessfully in diversion or probation programs. Youth in these programs may be allowed limited access to the community.

Non-secure programs provide year-round educational services focused on the attainment of a high school diploma, GED, college credit, or available vocational programming. The majority of these programs receive additional funding for specialized treatment services based on per diem and the total number of beds. Youth have an anticipated length of stay of three to nine months to complete their individualized treatment plan.

Programs within the non-secure restrictiveness level are physically-secure or staff-secure facilities. Security features vary from program to program depending on the location and physical layout of the facility. Some non-secure programs have security fences around the perimeter of the facility grounds and use hardware, such as electronic surveillance equipment, to assist with program security.

At the beginning of FY 2015-16, there were 48 non-secure residential programs operating in the state that provided non-secure services.

## Outcome Evaluation Performance

The following table shows the Residential Program Profile Summaries and Outcomes, which includes total releases, the percentage of youth adjudicated for offenses committed during placement (ODP), number of completions and completion rates, demographic characteristics, average length of stay, and recidivism rates. Program Profile Summaries and Outcomes are based on the number of youth who completed a non-secure, low- or moderate-risk residential program in FY 2014-15.

# HIGH-RISK RESIDENTIAL PROGRAMS

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High-risk residential programs are staff and hardware-secured. Youth assessed and classified for this level of placement require close supervision in a secure, structured residential setting. Placement in programs at this level is prompted by a concern for public safety that outweighs placement in programs that are less secure. High-risk programs offer limited access to the community, if during the last 60 days of residential placement, the youth is evaluated to be at a low risk to offend while in the community.

In addition to year-round educational services focused on the attainment of a high school diploma, GED, college credit, or the available vocational programming, youth also receive an array of integrated services. Youth have an anticipated length of stay of nine to twelve months to complete their individualized treatment plan.

At the beginning of FY 2015-16, there were 17 high-risk residential programs operating in the state.

## **Outcome Evaluation Performance**

# MAXIMUM-RISK RESIDENTIAL PROGRAMS

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Maximum-risk residential programs are the most secure juvenile residential facilities operated by the Department, and these programs serve youth who are considered a very high risk to the public. All services are provided on the grounds of the facility, including education, vocational programming, counseling, and medical services. Youth do not leave the premises for any reason other than to receive medical attention that cannot be obtained on the grounds or to make court appearances. Youth receive year-round education focused on the attainment of a high school diploma, GED, college credit, or available vocational programming. Youth in maximum-risk programs may be retained until their 22nd birthday. Each facility is required to provide for single-cell occupancy, with the exception that youth may be housed together during pre-release transition.

Youth have a statutorily mandated length of stay of 18 to 36 months.

At the beginning of FY 2015-16, there were six maximum-risk residential programs operating in the state.
