





What is Civil Citation?

- Statewide process
- Authorized in Section 985.12Florida Statues
- Alternative to judicial handling
- Non-serious misdemeanant offenders
- Focus is to prevent further delinquency





Legislative Requirements

Section 985.12, Florida Statutes, authorizes local governments to establish civil citation programs and requires:

- Statewide implementation at local level
- Non-serious misdemeanors
- Assessment of needs
- Entity must report youth data to DJJ for tracking and analysis of results and trends

Benefits of Civil Citation Why Civil Citation?

For Florida's 2013-2014 fiscal year:

- 44,634 youth
 referred to FDJJ
- 22,253 of those committed misdemeanors





Benefits of Civil Citation Why Civil Citation?

Shift to early intervention and diversion model by:

- 1. Keeping youth that pose no real threats to public safety out of system
- Reducing costs of processing youth for misdemeanors
- Freeing up limited resources to focus on more serious and violent offenders

Advantages

- Enhances Public Safety
- Avoids Costs
- Services Based on Needs Assessment
- Better use of Resources
- Reduces Disproportionate Representation
- Addresses Zero-tolerance Policies
- No Criminal Record



Eligibility

Juveniles have:

- Committed a non-serious misdemeanor offense.
- No prior criminal history.
- Can receive up to three civil citations.



Eligibility

The following misdemeanor cases may not be appropriate for civil citation; however, based on the circumstances of the offense on a case by case basis, the youth may be served by civil citation if it is in the best interest of the youth and the public.

- Any misdemeanor involving the possession or use of a firearm
- Any misdemeanor involving exposure of sexual organs or other sexual related behavior, i.e., lewd and lascivious behavior
- A misdemeanor that is directly related to, or a part of, gang activity



Eligibility Exceptions

Misdemeanor offenses eligible with approval of victim, family, and state attorney.

- Battery
- Assault
- Non-firearm weapon possessions cases
- Animal cruelty

Requirements

- Community Service
- **Intervention Services**



- Other Sanctions or Services
 - School progressing monitoring
 - Restitution
 - Letter of apology
 - Pre-vocational skills



Responsible Agencies

- Law Enforcement
- Department of Juvenile Justice
- Juvenile Assessment Center
- County/Municipality or entity they select

Civil Citation Process Steps

Step 1

Youth taken to Civil Citation Operating Entity

Step 2

Operating Entity will:

- Conduct search
- Explain program
- Enter information in Prevention Web

Step 3

Case manager completes assessment and assigns services

Step 4

Youth participates in civil citation process

Step 5

Successful completion of civil citation



Unsuccessful Completion

Youth will not successfully complete civil citation if the youth:

- Fails to report for a work assignment
- Fails to complete a work assignment
- Fails to comply with assigned intervention services
- Commits a subsequent delinquent act

Unsuccessful Case Procedures

- Complete the booking process
- Provide state attorney:
 - Recommendation of final civil citation closure
 - Copy of arrest form
 - Notice to appear release agreement
 - Recommended treatment plan
 - Booking documents
